Platform One: Idea of America Seminar Program



Our core program is a seminar-discussion debate forum where civic-minded adults can gather face-to-face. We view it important to provide a forum to discuss current issues and challenges facing our nation and our local communities in a safe setting where participants respect differing views and opinions and each other. Such a setting can be the continuing education programs of local universities and colleges, places of worship, senior centers, libraries, book clubs and other local civic-minded institutions.

Platform Two: Coming of Age in America Youth Program

Our second platform has developed special after-school programs to engage junior-high school students in history and civics. These are designed to reach youth at critical life stages when they are developing their own self-awareness, identities and values. Our programs are a combination of role-playing, interactive games built upon actual historical events that relate to current times and community mentoring. The highly successful Maine Youth Alliance of Belfast, Maine, better known as the “the Game Loft” is our partner in developing these creative programs. Our goal is to have communities across the nation adopt these Idea of America after-school programs.


